Our schedule is as follows:

- **By 22 October 2018**, please confirm your enrollment in the seminar by e-mailing us both at <u>olearyn1@xavier.edu</u> and <u>jayme.yeo@belmont.edu</u>. Please check the contact information we have for you (attached) and let us know if we should make any changes. It is especially important that we have your preferred name and email address. We also welcome your initial thoughts on how your work or interests engage with our topic. Our role is to facilitate productive discussion, and the sooner we can start this work, the better.
- **7 December 2018**: Please email us the title and abstract (200-300 words) of your proposed paper. Additionally, please send the bibliographic information for 2-3 articles or books that have shaped your interest or

work in our topic. We will then compile and distribute the abstracts and collective bibliography.

- **8 February 2019**: Please email your seminar paper to us. Your paper should be no more than 3000 words, excluding references. After we receive the papers, we will compile and distribute them, and we will divide the seminar into small groups and assign responses.
- 22 March 2019: Please send us two final items: (1) brief responses to the other papers in your small group and (2) 1-2 questions about how the papers in your group speak to our larger seminar topic. If you wish to revise your abstract, send that at this time as well.
- **17-20 April 2019**: We meet in Washington, D.C., specific date and time to be announced. We hope to get together for a meal or drinks either before or after our seminar meeting.

Finally, a reminder: SAA guidelines stipulate that "No paper should be recirculated in any form or any venue without the author's permission, and seminar abstracts should be treated in the same way as papers read or circulated. Permission must be obtained before citing unpublished work heard or read at the conference. Also to be observed are the SAA's Social Media Guidelines for digital distribution, in real time or in retrospect, of the content of panels or seminars."
